
President's Message:



Elevate and Innovate

The 72nd Annual District Three Conference was held in Cherokee, NC, embracing the theme of *Elevate and Innovate*. We were hosted by Dimple Overstreet, District 3 Governor; Linda Smith, Altrusa International President; and the District 3 Board. The 83 attendees represented 18 clubs from Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina.

The guest speaker at the opening ceremony was Michael Parker, the current Chairman of Tribal Council for the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. He shared the Cherokee is a sovereign nation, meaning it has its own laws, elections, government, institutions, etc.

Friday started with breakfast and an entertaining speech by Yvette Pue, Altrusa International of Orlando-Winter Park, FL. She punctuated her inspirational take on *Elevate and Innovate* with humor and a few well-aimed candy tosses. A business meeting followed where District Three Officers were elected.

Altrusa of St. Augustine contributed pitchers, serving spoons, potholders, cookbooks, and other items to the service project. These items were used to create centerpieces for the tables (see pictures). After the convention, these will become part of the *Kitchen Shower* Service Project providing kitchen items to North Carolina hurricane victims.

Altrusa of St. Augustine was recognized as having the most volunteer hours per member, and won 3rd Place in the International Mamie L Bass Service Award for *Birthdays are so Important*, our Sebastian Segui Backpacks and Port in the Storm service projects.

There were workshops for those attending. One that drew much attention was on Cherokee Heritage featuring Dustin Tramper (right), a Cherokee storyteller dedicated to sharing and preserving Cherokee cultural heritage. He explained traditional Cherokee dress, customs, and history. He taught a native dance to those interested. He said there are no swear words in the Cherokee language, so if he gets really upset, he uses English. He shared several stories including how the rabbit lost its tail.

Chris Plant, Linda Herrera, Louise Bowman, Vicki Sellner, and Brian Bowman (pictured below) comprised the delegation from St. Augustine. They manned a vendor table during the conference selling copies of What's Cookin' in St. Augustine (our new cookbook) as well as handmade potholders and other handmade items.
